This Week's Reflection from Catholic Teaching

The Heart of the Infant Jesus

"There is in the Sacred Heart the symbol and express image of the infinite love of Jesus Christ which moves us to love in return." (Pope Leo XIII)

REFLECT: The catechism, echoing John 3:16, notes that "the Word became flesh so that we might know God's love...so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." But why come as an infant, and in such humble circumstances? "Surely if He had so willed it," wrote St. Chrysologus, "He might have come moving the heavens, making the earth to shake, and shooting forth his thunderbolts; but such was not the way of His going forth."

Pope Benedict notes that God poured himself out for us "recklessly" in his Incarnation. The "Heart of Jesus is not concerned with self-preservation but with self-surrender." In the Incarnation, God does something that He could not have done apart from the incarnation. He comes to us as an infant, helpless and dependent, trusting in the care of Mary and Joseph for his very survival.

"God's sign is simplicity," writes Benedict. "God's sign is the baby. God's sign is that he makes himself small for us. This is how he reigns. He does not come with power and outward splendor. He comes as a baby.... He does not want to overwhelm us with his strength. He takes away our fear of his greatness. He asks for our love: so he makes himself a child.... God made himself small so that we could understand him, welcome him, and love him."

"It is no magic formula he brings," writes St. Josemaria, "because he knows that the salvation he offers must pass through human hearts. What does he first do? He laughs and cries and sleeps, as a helpless baby, although he is God incarnate. And he does this so that we may fall in love with him, so that we may learn to take him in our arms."

The Nativity Crèche Tradition

Precisely eight centuries ago, in 1223, St. Francis of Assisi created the first Nativity scene. Wanting to underscore the humble circumstances surrounding the birth of Jesus and kindle a deeper reverence for the Christmas narrative among the local populace, St. Francis ingeniously staged a live Nativity scene in a cave in the Italian village of Greccio. This extraordinary spectacle, also known as a crèche (from Old French for crib), featured live animals and a manger strewn with hay as a vivid reenactment of the sacred birth of Jesus as chronicled in the Gospels. Thus, began a tradition that has spread around the world, with Nativity scenes now adorning Christmas celebrations everywhere. Whether the Nativity scene is in St. Peter's Square in Rome, in this church, or in your home, it beckons you to reflect on Jesus' birth two millennia ago and express grateful wonder.
